The first time I heard of a wine making treasure trove

The average family of three spent only 6 taels of silver per year, indicating the high price of this type of wine, which means that ordinary Chinese people cannot afford it. Let's get back to the main story. After listening to the introduction of the French consul, Zhang Bishi tasted the wine and it was indeed a mellow and fragrant one. Seeing the two guests so fascinated, the French Consul continued to tell them, "Actually, the soil, climate, and temperature in northern China, such as Yantai and Tianjin, are particularly suitable for growing wine grapes." Zhang Bishi curiously asked the other party, "Friend, how did you know?" The French Consul recalled the past and said, "In 1860 (the Second Opium War), which is what you Chinese people call the Xianfeng Ten Years, I served as a soldier with the French army in Yantai and Tianjin. Many local grapes grew in these two places, and the soldiers used small wine making machines to extract juice and brew their own wine, resulting in very unique wine." "It's very delicious. In the end, some soldiers planned to stay in Yantai or Tianjin for a long time and establish companies specializing in grape

cultivation and wine making. Later, as the war gradually subsided, we withdrew and the situation was put on hold." The two of them thought to themselves, but Zhang Bishi thought about when we Chinese people could make wine ourselves, so that the Chinese people could also afford this expensive "foreign wine". Perhaps due to the love and traction of the god of wine, Yantai quietly appeared in the words of the unintentional, and stirred up ripples and imprints in the hearts of those with intentions. It is said that this is the reason why Zhang Bishi founded Changyu Brewing Company in Yantai.
